Currently San Francisco still remains in High Alert with 7.8 new cases per 100,000 population. This is equal to about 68 new cases daily in San Francisco. This indicator continues to improve from a peak in July, reflecting an optimistic trend. ## What PPE should 1st responders be wearing?

Due to concern for novel infection transmission to first responders during emergency responses, the UCSF Code Blue Committee recommends the use of full personal protective equipment (PPE) for any person responding to assist in a medical emergency. Based on this recommendation starting September 10<sup>th</sup>, we will now have a PPE Pack in each inpatient room across adult and children's hospitals. Each pack will contain: 2 face shields, 1 small N95 mask, 1 medium N95 mask, and 2 gowns. If other providers (or Code Blue Team/EMS) are also called, they will bring additional PPE.

Ambulatory and other areas will be included in a later phase.

## How should we handle testing constraints and testing requests from asymptomatic patients?

UCSF Health is expanding COVID-19 PCR testing to certain asymptomatic patients in the greater community. We would like to provide clinicians with support regarding Covid test ordering to ensure that our testing supplies remain available for our highest-need patients, particularly if and when constraints in supply chain emerge.

A new COVID-19 PCR APeX order is being created to reflect 4 "Priority Levels" to guide clinicians at the point of order entry and is anticipated to be available in the next few weeks. In the meantime, testing is allowable for the indications noted below, but should be used judiciously for lower priority groups to conserve supplies. Level 3 and 4 may have longer turnaround times (72 - 96 hrs).

Any significant testing capacity change may require a pause in testing for some groups which will be reflected in the order and communicated via our usual channels.

#### What is new with the delivery process for washable gowns?

Beginning Monday, September 14<sup>th</sup>, 2020, the yellow washable gown delivery process will be modified. The gowns will be delivered in a reusable cloth sack in place of plastic bags. The cloth sack holds a total of five (5) gowns. To maintain inventory of the reusable delivery sack, please refrain from discarding the sack in the garbage. The delivery sack can be washed with the linens and reused. ## How can I get my flu vaccine this year?

Based on a UC executive order, all UCSF employees need to be vaccinated for the flu by November 1st.

There are a number of ways to obtain your vaccines:

- To find flu deputies across UCSF clinics and hospitals please visit the <u>Occupational Health Services (OHS) flu site</u>, or ask your supervisor during a team huddle.
- OHS flu clinics across UCSF clinical and campus sites started Sept. 8
- Through your primary care provider or other health plan options.
- At OHS campus sites start Sept. 28.
- OHS has extended Flu Outreach clinic hours to cover night shift workers and a Saturday clinic for those working
  on the weekend, as well as clinics in our Oakland, Berkeley, Emeryville and Brisbane sites.
